

At a special meeting held in the High School building Monday evening, the Waterbury Mothers' Club voted to sponsor the purchase of an inhalator as added equipment for the Village Fire Department.

The inhalator is vitally necessary and used in conjunction with artificial respiration in saving the lives of those nearly drowned, asphyxiated by either gas or carbon monoxide or electrical It should not be confused with the pulmotor which being a mechanical affair was very unsatisfactory in many ways and probably lost as many lives as it saved.

The firemen have spent considerable time and effort in studying and attending first aid classes every week in the anticipation of this purchase so that they would be better able to use it to advantage.

Several local organizations will be called upon to help as the purchase price is two hundred dollars, including two extra tanks which enable it to be used for several hours without refills. It is hoped they will all appreciate the necessity of such an apparatus so that the fund may be quickly reached.
