WATERBURY FIRE DEPT. RESPONDED AND SAVED NEARBY BUILDINGS

HOME OF WALTER STERL-

Fire of unknown origin destroyed the home of Walter Sterling at South Duxbury Monday night. The fire was first seen by Mrs. Sterling when she was retiring at about 11:30, the glare on the window attracting her attention. The fire started in the barn which was practically empty. place known in earlier years as Belding's Hall was a rambling set of buildings, consisting of the house to which was attached the long hall in the second story with delco room, ice house, woodshed and other rooms underneath and to this was attached the barn. A garage away from these buildings containing a car not in use at the present time, was also burned.

The Waterbury Fire Department was summoned from John Bisbee's and gave assistance through the night. There was much danger from grass fire which spread rapidly.

The family which includes Mr. and Mrs. Sterling and Isabelle DeLisle escaped scantily clothed and nothing was saved but a small amount of clothing and a very few pieces of furniture. Many antiques of priceless value, a much treasured piano as well as the car used by the family were included in the loss. After Mr. Sterling left the house he returned to try and save something but was over come by the smoke and had to be pulled out through the window.

The loss has been estimated \$5000 and is partially covered by insurance. There is strong suspicion that the fire was incendiary.

The home of Ralph Bisbee close by was seriously threatened and a building directly across the road from the Sterling home, formerly used as a wayside store by the Sterlings, but now occupied by Leon Griffith and family, caught fire and was vacated but the fire was extinguished. Sterling dance hall a little farther awav was saved.
